PITTSFIELD BOY SCOUT TROOP 84

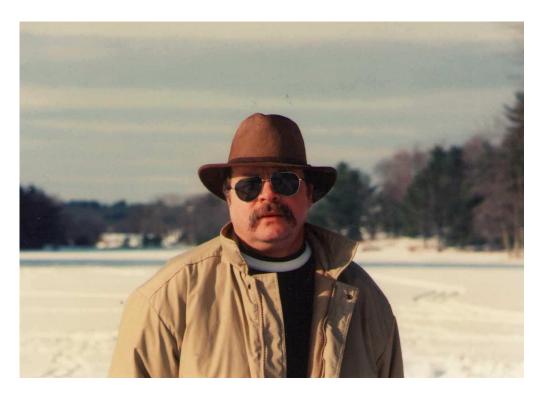

Raymond Chapman January 18, 1948 – October 12, 2008

Ray Chapman began attending Town and School District meetings most likely for the same reason that other parents and taxpayers get involved, to understand the process and why taxes continue to rise. Between the early and mid-ninety's he graduated to volunteering his time to various committees and boards including Budget, Planning, Zoning, and economic development efforts. He dedicated at least ten years of his life to serving his community.

One committee that he thoroughly enjoyed working with and served on the longest was the B.C.E.P. He was proud of the accomplishments of the facility because he truly believed in the importance of recycling throughout all communities. During his tenure he always left meetings happy and pleased with the fact that, not only was the recycling center being run efficiently, but it was actually making money, in turn saving tax dollars. He appreciated working in such a positive environment with a great bunch of guys.

Ray was a caring, kind, and generous man who was well liked by those who knew and served with him. Despite his first diagnosis of cancer in 1997 he continued to serve throughout his chemotherapy and radiation treatments until it took such a toll on his body that he finally had to resign from all community service. He demonstrated an exemplary example of community spirit, always giving his best to keeping the committee meetings productive, positive, and on track. The loss of Ray Chapman will truly leave a void in the Pittsfield community.

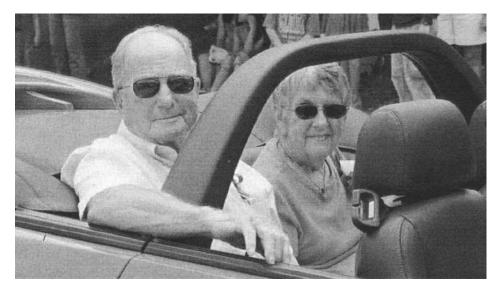


Robert Lemer September 17, 1929 – November 21, 2008

Robert Lemer, found a lasting joy teaching and guiding adolescents for over forty years. Bob found his bliss, as he called it, after a round about journey. After graduating from Syracuse University (1951), he entered Harvard Law School but left after his third year, unsure of what he wanted to do in life. In US Army during the Korean War, he served as special agent with the Counter Intelligence Corp, interrogating captured North Koreans. He then enrolled at Harvard Business School and after graduation (MBA 1960) founded with three other graduates a company called Geochron which dated archaeological and geological specimens using carbon—14 and potassium—argon methods. After years hovering around 25 cents a share, the company became successful. Looking back over his life, he recalled one of his happiest times in his hometown of Camp Hill, Pennsylvania; leading a Boy Scout Explorer troop along with an old boyhood friend. So working with adolescents became his chosen career. He enrolled at the Harvard Graduate School of Education to earn his MAT degree (1963). He taught history and social studies at Wellesley High School in Massachusetts for six years and was highly admired by the students and fellow faculty members for his lively classroom discussions and overall spirit.

Bob taught at Somersworth High School and at the Derryfield School in Manchester before earning his last credential as a guidance counselor from Antioch-New England. Bob's liveliness and dedication made him immensely popular with students and fellow teachers at other schools where he worked, including Trinity, Newfound, Henniker and Weare. He retired from Spaulding High School in Raymond after five years as guidance director and that year the senior class yearbook was dedicated to him. Bob loved working with students, helping them to grow into responsible adults but hoping that in that journey they didn't lose the occasional spark, joy and humor of adolescence. Bob's shortfall was paper work, which he referred to as "administrivia." Indeed one principal told him he was too "kidoriented," but Bob regarded that as a compliment. Bob missed the company of students and never really retired. He was a teacher-aide at a number of schools ending at Coe Brown Academy, one of the best he thought, of the many schools he had worked at. He helped found the school chess club, and when Parkinson's disease prevented full time attendance joined the chess club for their Tuesday afternoon games, arriving in wheel chair. He rarely lost a game. Bob had also worked in guidance at Pittsfield High School where popular as ever, the senior class in 1974 and 1981 choose him as their commencement speaker. For the Town of Pittsfield, Bob also worked hard as a member of the Space Needs Committee to persuade the town to pass a construction bond to upgrade Pittsfield Middle High School. He also served for three years on the Josiah Carpenter Library Board of Trustees.

Richard & Lois Foss Named Pittsfield's Citizens Of The Year 2008

Richard and Lois Foss have been named Pittsfield's Citizens of the Year for 2008. They did something extraordinary in 2008 - they gave \$1,000,000 to benefit Pittsfield Middle High School graduates. This will empower Pittsfield's future citizens and leaders to bring something back to this community which has afforded them the opportunities of a small town with a not so small heart. This domino effect will reach out and empower more people to energize this town to a potential not yet dreamed of. They have believed in Pittsfield, never giving in to what can't be done, but underwriting what can. This, not the money, is what the Fosses have done that is extraordinary.

Sometimes it takes only one great action to bring the Citizen of the Year plaque to someone, but in this case there are many other things that recommend the Fosses for this honor. Mr. Foss served his country and upon returning was active in the Peterson-Cram Legion Post. He was long a business owner in Pittsfield with many contributions being made through his construction business. He is responsible for our senior housing apartments just off Main Street which have provided our elderly with comfortable, inexpensive places to live. He developed the subdivision on Molly Lane and erected all of its houses. He later developed the property around White's Pond, better known as Winsunvale, a name that he gave the development.

His company completed the work of raising the Episcopal Church and placing the addition on the holding tomb at Floral Park Cemetery. He also built the Globe Building and his former office building serves as the location of Brown Engineering, the Paige Insurance Agency and Jefferson Pilot Investments. While being involved as businessman, he also served personally as selectman and budget committee member. He was instrumental in planting the spruce Town Christmas Tree next to the Episcopal Church.

It takes a team to make the decisions and direct the actions necessary to be involved in so much. Lois was the impetus and balance necessary for the Fosses' insightful involvement. When they retired to Gilmanton the Fosses remained a support to Pittsfield projects - helping the Pittsfield Players with renovations and placing new bathrooms in the Scenic Theatre; helping to remove the bell from the tower of what is now the Community Center and placing it on the Police Department lawn; creating the Foss Family Foundation to support worthy undertakings on a personal and community level; working with the Historical Society and Legion to erect the two wings on the Veterans Monument in Dustin Part last year; serving as Clerk of the Works and donating to the Youth Baseball Athletic Park.

What does it take to be named Pittsfield's Citizens of the Year - a willing spirit, a generous heart and never-ending optimism.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall Meeting Room at 85 Main Street in said Town on the second Tuesday in March next, March 10, 2009, to act upon the subjects herein mentioned. You are hereby warned that on said date and at said place the polls will be opened at 7:00 AM and will remain open until 7:00 PM for the reception of your ballots under the Non-Partisan Ballot System. You are hereby warned that on Saturday, March 14, 2009, at 10:00 AM at the Pittsfield Elementary School Gymnasium, the matter of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

TO BE TAKEN UP TUESDAY, MARCH 10, 2009

- Article 1: To choose by ballot the following officers: two Selectmen for a three (3) year term; one Selectmen for a one (1) year term; two Planning Board Members for a three (3) year term; one Planning Board Member for a one (1) year term; a Town Clerk/Tax Collector for a three (3) year term; a Trustee of the Trust Funds for a three (3) year term; a Library Trustee for a three (3) year term; two Ethics Committee Members for a three (3) year term; one Ethics Committee Member for a one (1) year term;
- Article 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: amend Table 1 (Zoning Districts and Uses) as it relates to commercial agriculture, bakeries. cluster developments. greenhouses, restaurants, truck/heavy equipment and trailer repairs, two family dwellings and manufactured housing parks? (Recommended by the Planning Board 4-3)
- Article 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: amend Table 2 (Dimensional Regulations) to add density and minimum lot size requirements for the suburban and rural zoning districts?

(Recommended by the Planning Board 4-3)

- Article 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: amend Table 2 (Dimensional Regulations) to exempt fences, driveways, roads, flag poles, light poles, wells, septic systems, electric and phone boxes, signs, sidewalks, curbing, drainage and/or sediment ponds from setback requirements? (Recommended by the Planning Board 4-3)
- Article 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: add a definition of frontage? (Recommended by the Planning Board 4-3)
- **Article 6:** Are you in favor of the following petitioned zoning amendment as proposed below:

 - 2. Replace existing Article 2, Zoning Districts, to add new zoning district descriptions and use and dimensional regulations and to move existing parking regulations to the new Article 16, Parking Regulations.
 - 3. Replace existing Article 3, Definitions, to revise existing definitions, including for cluster subdivision, and to add some new definitions, including for frontage on Class V highways.
 - 4. Replace existing Article 4, Non-Conforming Structures, Lots and Uses, with new Article 4, Nonconforming Structures, Uses, and Lots, to clarify the language generally.
 - 5. Replace existing Article 5, Board of Adjustment, to clarify Board of Adjustment administrative procedures and to provide for popular election of Board of Adjustment members.
 - 6. Replace existing Article 6, Special Exceptions, to clarify special exception permitting conditions and procedures.
 - 7. Replace existing Article 7, Variances, to clarify variance permitting requirements according to Boccia v. Portsmouth.
 - 8. Replace existing Article 8, Cluster Development, to revise permitting conditions for cluster development.

- 9. Replace existing Article 9, Signs, to remove the existing requirement for Zoning Board approval of signs that do not emit light or noise, and to set standards for home occupation signs.
- 10.Revise existing Article 10, Manufactured Housing & Manufactured Housing Parks, to change capitalization and references to renamed regulations in Article 2.
- 11. Add Article 13, Site Plan Review Exemption Thresholds.
- 12. Revise existing Article 14, Storage Containers, to change capitalization and punctuation.
- 13.Replace existing Article 16, Parking Requirements, to include parking regulations removed from Article 2, and to provide for special exceptions.
- 14.Delete existing Articles 22, 23, and 24, which have been combined in the new Article 1.

Article 7: Pursuant to RSA 673:2 II (c), are you in favor of returning to the methodology for choosing the members of the Pittsfield Planning Board to that of appointment by the Selectboard, as was utilized by the Town of Pittsfield until March 2008, instead of the present one year old method of electing members to the office. (Submitted by Petition)

TO BE TAKEN UP SATURDAY, MARCH 14, 2009:

- **Article 8:** Are you in favor of amending the Town of Pittsfield Housing Standards Ordinance as proposed by the Housing Standards Agency to make editorial changes; to correct code references; to limit the duration of a permit to two years, renewable; and to change the enforcement procedures to comply with RSA 48-A?
- Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and consider entering into a long-term land lease with Septic Disposal Solutions, LLC (SDS) for the purpose of allowing Septic Disposal Solutions, LLC to continue to dewater and compost septage.

- Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Public Works Salt Storage Building Capital Reserve created in 2005. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. It is estimated that approximately One Thousand One Hundred Twenty Five Dollars (\$1,125.) remains in the capital reserve. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee 12-0)
- **Article 11:** To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Town Hall Building Capital Reserve created in 1983. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. It is estimated that approximately Five Thousand One Hundred Fifty Eight Dollars (\$5,158.) remains in the capital reserve. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee 12-0)
- **Article 12:** To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable trust under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Health Insurance Premium Expendable Trust, for the purpose of limiting the impact of health insurance premium increases in any given year, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.) for this fund; and further to appoint the Selectmen as trustees of the fund and agents to expend. (Estimated gross tax impact less than \$0.01) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee 8-4)
- **Article 13:** To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable trust under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Emergency Appropriation Expendable Trust, for the purpose of purchasing supplies and maintaining equipment for Town Departments as a result of unanticipated emergencies, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.) for this fund; and further to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend. (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.05). (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee 7-5)
- **Article 14:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) to be added to the Fire and Rescue Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Reserve Fund balance is \$232,805.83 on 12-31-08) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.10) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee 10-2-2)

Moderator Cedric Dustin called the 2008 Town Meeting to order at 10:06am on Saturday, March 15, 2008 in the Pittsfield Elementary School Gymnasium.

Police Chief Robert Wharem led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Dustin explained the ground rules for the meeting. There will be no debate until a Motion has been made and seconded. The debate is limited to the motion in question. Anyone wishing to speak will use the microphone and identify him/herself. All remarks and questions shall be addressed to the Moderator and not to members of the body present. Any amendment to a Motion must be made in writing and given to the Moderator. Only one amendment will be considered at a time. All votes will be by cards unless it is a secret ballot. The use of the secret ballot on any one Article is permitted if and whenever five voters make a written request to the Moderator prior to the card vote on that Article.

Moderator Dustin read the introduction to the posted 2008 Town Meeting Warrant ~

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsfield, Merrimack County and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall Meeting Room at 85 Main Street in said Town on the second Tuesday in March next, March 11, 2008, to act upon the subjects herein mentioned. You are hereby warned that on said date and at said place the polls will be opened at 8:00 AM and will remain open until 7:00 PM for the reception of your ballots under the Non-Partisan Ballot System. You are hereby warned that on Saturday, March 15, 2008, at 10:00 AM at the Pittsfield Elementary School Gymnasium, the matter of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

Moderator Dustin read the results of the ballot votes of the 2008 Annual Town Election held on Tuesday, March 11, 2008 \sim

Article 1: To choose by ballot the following officers: one Selectmen for a three (3) year term; a Town Moderator for a two (2) year term; a Town Treasurer for a three (3) year term; a Trustee of the Trust Funds for a one (1) year term; a Trustee of the Trust Funds for a three (3) year term; a Library Trustee for a three (3) year term; a Supervisor of the Checklist for a six (6) year term; two Ethics Committee Members for a one (1) year term; two Ethics Committee Members for a one (1) year term; two Planning Board Members for a two (2) year term and two Planning Board Members for a three (3) year term.

Selectwoman Small presented Chairman Morse with a gift of appreciation for serving as a Selectboard member for the years 2005 to 2008.

Moderator Dustin then moved on to the warrant articles that were to be taken up at the 2008 Town Meeting, March 15, 2008 ~

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the purpose of creating a Forest Management Plan, said sum to come from the Town's unreserved fund balance. (There is no impact on the tax rate)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 2 as written, Selectman Vien seconded.

A short discussion regarding the plan management and the existing conservation commission funds took place and an explanation was made that this article was to be funded from a timber cut was completed last year, this is a portion of the revenue that was received.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 2 as read passed.

Article 3: Shall the Town increase its optional veterans' tax credit adopted pursuant to RSA 72:28 from One Hundred Dollars (\$100) to Three Hundred Dollars (\$300)? (Assuming 192 residents are eligible the estimated gross tax impact is \$0.12)

Selectman Konopka moved to accept Article 3 as read, Chairman Morse seconded.

Theodore Mitchell stated that as having served 21 years in the Navy, the existing \$100 credit was an insult to those who have served the country.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 3 as read passed.

Article 4: Shall the Town vote to require that the numeric tally of votes by the Budget Committee and the Board of Selectmen relative to budget items or warrant articles be printed on the warrant? RSA 32:5, V-a.

Selectman Vien moved to accept Article 4 as read, Selectwoman Small seconded.

Selectman Vien clarified that this would be just a numeric count, would not list the names.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 4 as read passed.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be added to the Municipal Building Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$82,650.11 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.16)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 5 as written, Selectman Vien seconded.

A discussion took place regarding the status of the Space Needs Study that was conducted in the previous year and the relationship of this fund in comparison to the fund in Article 7, this Article is funding a capital reserve for the town buildings, Article 7 is for repairs and maintenance for town buildings.

At the end of the discussion, a card vote on Article 5 was conducted.

As Moderator Dustin could not readily determine the outcome he asked the Supervisors count the cards on a re-vote.

Article 5 passed after the card re-vote was conducted, the Supervisors counted Yes (55) and No (54)

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Property Acquisition and Redevelopment Expendable Trust Fund for the purpose of acquiring and/or redeveloping land and buildings to enhance the long term economic growth and stability of Pittsfield, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to be placed in this Fund: and further to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend. The Selectmen are directed to conduct a public hearing prior to expending from this Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.32)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 6 as written, Selectman Vien seconded.

A lengthy discussion took place regarding what this money would/could be used for and also the progress of the Economic Development Committee during the past year.

A motion was made and seconded to move to the question. A card vote to move to question passed.

Moderator Dustin then explained that the next vote was on Article 6.

A card vote on Article 6 as read passed.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Municipal Buildings Repair and Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund for the purpose of timely and effective repairs to any Town owned building in Pittsfield, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.) to be placed in this fund; and further to appoint the selectmen as

agents to expend. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.16)

Chairman Morse moved to accept Article 7 as read, Selectman Konopka seconded.

It was clarified that this article was to establish an expendable trust fund for building repairs, the existing capital reserve fund (that was funded in Article 5) for municipal buildings is meant for major renovations.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 7 as read passed.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Ninety Three Thousand Dollars (\$193,000) for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a pre-owned fire department ladder truck and to authorize the withdrawal of One Hundred and Ninety Three Thousand Dollars (\$193,000.) from the Fire and Rescue Apparatus Special Revenue Fund created for that purpose. (Reserve Fund balance is \$198,004.50 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Selectman Lenaerts moved to accept Article 8 as read, Selectman Vien seconded.

Members of the Budget Committee explained that the ladder truck purchase was not recommended for a few reasons; this purchase would deplete the capital reserve, that the department should wait for one more year to research the possibility of a multi-town group purchase since the neighboring towns have already started to meet regarding such issues/purchases, and there were two members that recused themselves from the budget committee vote to recommend as they were fire department members, as well.

There was a long discussion regarding the need of a ladder truck, what surrounding towns/mutual aid towns had ladder trucks and how often they were called to respond, where it would be housed, and the fire department staff's ability to operate a ladder truck.

At the end of the discussion, a card vote on Article 8 was conducted.

As Moderator Dustin could not readily determine the outcome he asked the Supervisors count the cards on a re-vote.

Article 8 *failed* after the card re-vote was conducted, the Supervisors counted Yes (66) and No (67)

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Fire and Rescue Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Reserve Fund balance is \$198,004.50 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.10)

After Moderator Dustin read Article 9 as printed on the Town Meeting Warrant, Chairman Morse moved to amend Article 9 \sim

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to be added to the Fire and Rescue Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Selectwoman Small seconded.

Chairman Morse explained that this would build the fund to have enough in four years to purchase the ladder truck. He also explained that Selectman Vien is serving on a committee with neighboring towns that is researching regionalization/cost sharing of such purchases.

Moderator Dustin explained that Article 9 is now at \$80,000. The tax impact would be \$0.26.

Merrill Vaughan questioned where the \$50,000 would come from, Chairman Morse replied with property taxes.

Don Chase moved to amend Article 9 back to the \$30,000 amount, Scot Palmer seconded the motion.

A card vote on the amendment passed.

As there was no further discussion on the article, Moderator Dustin re-read Article 9 as written, and a card vote on Article 9 as written at the \$30,000 amount, passed.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Six Thousand Dollars (\$46,000.) to be added to the Department of Public Works Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$65,776.74 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.15)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 10 as read, Selectman Vien seconded. Superintendent Bachelder explained that there are three, six-wheeled dump trucks; a 2005, a 1999, and a 1997. The next article is to replace the 1997 dump truck.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 10 as read passed.

At this point Chairman Morse thanked Superintendent Bachelder and his crew for the excellent job they do maintaining the roads. The audience responded with a standing ovation.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$135,000.) to purchase a new dump truck replacing the 1997 Ford N850 truck and authorize the withdrawal of Sixty Five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000.) from the Department of Public Works Capital Reserve Fund, with the balance of the purchase price, Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.), to come from the unreserved fund balance.

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 11 as read, Selectman Lenaerts seconded.

Rob Miller asked what was to be done with the old truck, Superintendent Bachelder replied that it would go to State auction in the fall and the town would receive the sale proceeds.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 11 as read passed.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.) to be added to the Department of Public Works Grader Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$1,762.78 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.05)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 12 as written, Selectman Vien seconded.

Don Chase asked of the impact if this article didn't pass, Superintendent Bachelder replied that the current grader was replaced in 2007 and should get 20 years of service, so the impact of it not passing should not affect the replacement schedule.

Don Chase moved to amend the article to \$5,000, Diane Vaughan seconded the motion.

After a short discussion on the amendment, a card vote on the amendment passed. As Moderator Dustin could not readily determine the outcome he asked the Supervisors count the cards on a revote.

Article 12 passed after the card re-vote was conducted, the Supervisors counted Yes (55) and No (49)

Moderator Dustin clarified that the article was now at \$5,000.

There being no further discussion, Moderator Dustin re-read the amended article and a card vote on Article 12 as amended to \$5,000 passed.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.) to be added to the Department of Public Works Loader Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$96,464.97 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.05)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 13 as read, Selectman Vien seconded.

The year/age of the current loader, 2002, was stated.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 13 as read passed.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.) to be added to the Department of Public Works Backhoe Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$43,420.78 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.03)

Chairman Morse moved to accept Article 14 as read, Selectwoman Small seconded.

A short discussion took place regarding the option of leasing the public works equipment.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 14 as read passed.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.) to be added to the Sidewalk Tractor Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$11,300.60 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.03)

Selectman Lenaerts moved to accept Article 15 as read, Selectman Konopka seconded.

There being no discussion, card vote on Article 15 as read passed.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.) to be added to the Small Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$43,548.37 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.03)

Selectman Vien moved to accept Article 16 as read, Selectman Konopka seconded.

Superintendent Bachelder explained that the current truck, a 2003 Ford-550, is overworked and will need to be replaced in the next few years.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 16 as read passed.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.) to be added to the Parks and Recreation Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$8,047.09 on 12-31-07.) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.01)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 17 as read, Chairman Morse seconded.

There being no discussion, card vote on Article 17 as read passed.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.) to repair the Dustin Park Band Pavilion and authorize the withdrawal from the Parks and Recreation Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Fund balance is \$8,047.09 on 12-31-07) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 18 as read, Selectman Konopka seconded.

There being no discussion, card vote on Article 18 as read passed.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand, Five Hundred and Seven Dollars (\$10,507.00) to finish the construction of the salt storage facility and to authorize the withdrawal of Ten Thousand Five Hundred and Seven Dollars (\$10,507.00) from the Salt Storage Facility Capital Reserve previously established for this purpose. (Fund balance on 12-31-07 is \$446,718.67) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 21 as read, Chairman Morse seconded.

A clarification was made regarding the meaning of 'there is no impact on the tax rate' in the warrant article, this particular amount will be offset by fund balance.

A short discussion took place regarding the need of the town hall meeting room floors to be replaced.

There being no further discussion, card vote on Article 22 as read passed.

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Computer System Renewal and Replacement and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500.) to be placed in this fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Estimated gross tax impact \$0.04)

Selectwoman Small moved to accept Article 23 as read, Selectman Lenaerts seconded.

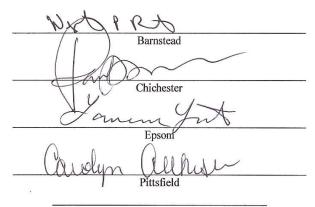

The biggest area of concern both internally and externally was communication. The need for more information to be disseminated to the community as to what needs to happen, where to go, or how to obtain food and water not only for humans but for animals, when something occurs. In the upcoming months articles will be placed in the Suncook Valley Sun advising people where different locations are and how to contact the Emergency Management Department when you need assistance. Also in the articles will be things that you can do to help yourself prepare for these incidents.

I look forward to working with the citizens of the community in the upcoming months to better prepare the Town of the next event.

FIRE AND AMBULANCE SERVICE

The Pittsfield Fire and Rescue Service have continued to provide a variety of emergency services to the community. The level of Emergency Medical Service provides transport and treatment at the highest level available. Fire suppression, hazardous material response, technical rescue, and fire prevention are provided by individuals dedicated to the protection of their fellow citizens. The Town of Pittsfield is fortunate to have these individuals who willingly accept the responsibility and risk associated with protecting the community.

The average member of the department will spend 192 hours the first year studying basic fire fighting, 160 hours attending department training, 210 hours responding and operating at emergencies, and participate in 12 hours of community events.

Training is a large part of the department's activities. In 2008 one member attended the Fire Fighter I program and completed an EMT course. Two members of the department attended the Inspector II certification class and two members attended the New Hampshire/ Vermont two-state week end at the National Fire Academy in Emittsburg, Md. Four members of the department attended the North Country EMS Conference where they experienced an opportunity to enhance their skills and knowledge. Many members have attended the training programs offered through Concord Hospital during the year.

Emergency medical training is a continual process required to maintain licenses. Many of the full and part time staff completed the required 24 hour recertification courses and will be completing the exam process during the first quarter of 2009. A full time employee completed the 1200 hour Paramedic program and is now fully licensed as a Paramedic. The full time staff currently has three members who are Paramedics. Paramedic is the highest level of certification and allows the individual to perform advanced cardiac and critical care intervention skills.

The department participated in 15 community events in 2008. Members donate their time to insure that safety is maintained at fireworks events, veteran's ceremonies, civic events, school events, and parades. The Secret Santa program has been conducted by full and part time staff for the last few years. This year the event concluded during the middle of the ice storm. The department managed to deliver this program to over 140 families and provide emergency response.

Code enforcement is a combined effort by the on call and full time department personnel. Over 542 hours were expended in code enforcement, code research, inspection follow-up, and other life safety code activities.

Public education classes presented to civic groups and school programs were delivered throughout the year. The department open house during fire prevention week in October was well attended.

Department emergency activity in 2008 was slightly less than last year. In 2008 the department responded to 720 requests for emergency service compared to 726 calls in 2007. This trend was experienced by most of the departments in the 23 communities that comprise the Capital Area Compact.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

I would like to thank the many people who contributed to the departments programs and to the renovations this year. We received assistance from many people in the community from donations of materials, to labor to equipment. I would also like to thank the citizens of Pittsfield for their continued outstanding support. Without your continued support we would not be able to complete many of the tasks that the community has come to deserve and expect.

We added a couple of new programs this year. The two programs were a bicycle safety rodeo and Communication Letters to the landlords of the activities on their property. Both programs were well received and will continue into the future in order to make Pittsfield a nicer and safer community. Our goal for 2009 is to implement a couple more programs so that we offer one program a month in order to build bridges and cornerstones with kids, adults and seniors in our community.

The department hired some new officers this year and had some long time officers leave the department. Officer Clint Cassavaugh was hired to replace Officer Courtemanche who left the department and moved to Florida. Officers Jason Darrah and Justin Swift were hired part time to fill some of the vacant positions that we have. After nearly 6 years of service Officer Ralph K Booth resigned from the department, he will be missed and we wish him all the best on his future endeavors.

This year the department experienced an increase of calls for service for the years. We received over 7,000 calls for service up approximately 1,000 over last year. This is consistent with what other area towns are reporting and experiences. With the economy faltering and jobs being scarce we are seeing an increase in the areas of thefts, domestic disturbances, fraud and drug investigations.

This year we will continue to diligently work on apprehending individuals who deal drugs within the community and are going to focus on reducing the amount of domestic disturbances that our community experiences. We will do this through a balance of education, awareness and aggressive enforcement. The community calling in tips to the department will greatly assist us in this effort. To call in a tip anonymously you can call CONCORD CRIME LINE AT 226-3100.

The community has experienced at least one major natural disaster over the last couple of years and this year we experienced two: the tornado and the ice storm. Natural incidents such as these can be very taxing on the entire community. Everyone pulled together to get through these incidents without any injury or deaths resulting. This is a credit to the community and how we pull together when the chips are down.

Each and every year becomes more challenging for the police department and the community as law enforcement evolves into the electronic and digital age. With your continued support we will be able to meet these challenges and stay technically proficient in order to better serve our community.

I look forward to seeing and working with the citizens in the upcoming year and wish well to everyone who lives and visits Pittsfield.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Storms in the beginning of 2008 kept the highway crew very busy. In January we had 2 rain/ice storms and 4 snow storms totaling 25" of snow. In February we had 9 storms totaling 36" of snow. In March we had 7 storms totaling 14" of snow, and 1 storm in April with 1" of snow. During the spring we finished the site work and installed underground utilities to the sand and salt storage building. The construction of the building was also completed late spring.

The summer of 2008 was very rainy as in 2006 and 2007, and again we spent more time than normal repairing pot holes and washouts.

Reconstruction of Quail Ridge Road and Dove Lane was completed, with the replacement of culverts, adding from 6 to 12 inches of crushed gravel to the base, and repaving. Upper City Road and Fairview Road were shimmed and overlayed. Approximately 120' of underdrain was installed on Upper City Road. Cracks were sealed on Dowboro Road, Leavitt Road, River Road, Lyford Hill and a section of Tilton Hill Road.

We had heavy rain on July 21st, with many washouts, and the tornado that came through on July 24th caused extensive damage on Clough Road. We then had another heavy rainstorm on July 27th which caused flooding damage on many roads. More heavy rain on August 6th caused more washouts, and on Sept. 7th we had 5" of rain with major flooding damage that took us several days to repair.

Between all the road repairing, we did find time to cut and chip roadside brush on several roads, producing approximately 65 tons of wood chips.

November was mild, with only light snow on November 30th. In December we had 9 storms totaling 35" of snow and a record ice storm on December 11th, with heavy icing and record power outages. Some residents were over a week without power. The highway crew worked fast to clean up trees and debris, but there is some remaining that will have to be cleaned up in the spring, as it soon became buried with snow.

We had 3 storm events in 2008 that the town was able to apply for funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to help with repairs: the tornado on July 24th, heavy flooding on Sept. 7th and record ice storm on December 11th.

I would like to thank my crew again this year for their hard work. 2008 was a very difficult year, and I sincerely appreciate their dedication.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT

To the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Pittsfield:

The Pittsfield Welfare Department, as mandated by New Hampshire state law, provides temporary assistance to Pittsfield residents in need. During the year 2008, the welfare department provided assistance to 283 clients, approximately 57 of which were new clients.

This past year, through re-qualifying applicants, I was able to significantly reduce the direct assistance expenditures to a total of \$74,000.00..... returning \$26,000.00 to the Town's General Fund. The office also received through repayments by clients, a donation from the Congregational Church, and lien payments, unanticipated revenues totaling \$1,161.95, which also went to the Town's General Fund.

We have continued the enforcement of building codes and Pittsfield's Housing Standards Ordinance for any premise the Town's general assistance might cover. All rental properties are subject to inspection by the Building Inspector, Housing Standards Inspector, and the Deputy Welfare Director to ensure all properties are in compliance with the applicable codes. If the inspected rental unit does not comply, the Welfare Department will provide the landlord 45 days to come into compliance.

Again, I would like to thank Larry Konopka, the Deputy Welfare Director, for his continuing efforts and dedication in assisting this department.

The office operates on a part-time basis and by appointment only. Residents in need of assistance can reach me at 435-6773, ext.6 and leave a message on my voice mail. Certain qualifications and documentation are needed to qualify, and different options are always provided for residents to pursue.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Last year, the Board had less total applications than in 2007. The applications did require more meeting time and excessive research and deliberations before decisions were made. Some applications were very sensitive in nature, which took the Board's full attention and dedicated hard work to make fair and lawful decisions.

The purpose of the Zoning Board is to hear and decide Administrative Appeals, grant relief through the Variance process to property owners from the strict applications of the Zoning Ordinances, and grant Special Exceptions, if appropriate, for certain uses as authorized in the Ordinances.

Variances for uses not permitted in the Zoning Ordinances, Area Variances, and Special Exceptions may be granted provided the property owner meets the criteria established for the Board to grant such exemptions. This criteria is noted in the Pittsfield Zoning Ordinances.

The Zoning Board is composed of five appointed members and one or more alternate members, and meets on the second Thursday of each month at the Town Hall to review and consider applications before the Board. If there are no applications and no other business to conduct, the Board generally does not meet. It is up to the Board to help all applicants and residents to understand the Zoning Ordinances and how they work as well as the laws the Board must follow in making these decisions.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment met nine times during the year. The following applications were acted upon:

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

In 2008, the Pittsfield Economic Development Committee built upon an extremely successful and busy 2007. First, the YMCA survey that was begun and worked on in 2008 has been submitted to the national YMCA offices in Chicago. At this point in the process, the YMCA has read the survey and is in the process of conducting further exploration of establishing a YMCA in Pittsfield. The EDC has been in constant contact with the national YMCA on this issue and will continue to do so as the YMCA explores the possibility in more detail.

Building upon last year's success in securing grant money for the WiFi system, the EDC has been applying for and researching other grant opportunities. Grants are great way for the EDC to stretch the Town's dollars. This year the EDC has successfully secured a NH Department of Revenue and Economic Development Grant (NHDRED) in the amount of \$1,500 for operating expenses. The EDC is also awaiting a response from the NH Community Development Finance Authority (CDFA) on a grant called the Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP). The NHDRED grant will provide some operating revenue and the NSP grant would provide funds directly for revitalization purposes. The EDC is also in the process of looking several grants for next year: Community Development Block Grants, Plan New Hampshire, and the second round of the CDFA Neighborhood Stabilization Program. Of course all grants are subject to the grantor's priorities and requirements, but the EDC has had success in the past securing grants and will continue to pursue grants into the future.

The EDC has also had success over the past year in gaining the attention of, and networking with state and federal officials. First, Governor Lynch and representatives from Congressman Hodes', Senators Gregg's and Sununu's offices attended the WiFi cutting ceremony this past summer. In addition, the Governor was invited to attend an open house ceremony welcoming a new business to town; Amenico. Although the Governor was unable to attend on that date, he will be visiting the company later this year. Amenico is represents the new "green economy" that is discussed so much in the news; the company recycles waste cooking oil. Lastly, in March of this past year, Congressman Hodes paid a visit to town to chair a roundtable discussion on local economic development issues. Also in attendance were numerous representatives from state and federal agencies, as well as members of the Pittsfield business community and other interested persons. The EDC has also been involved with providing feedback on the projects for the upcoming federal stimulus package.

Another major accomplishment for the EDC in 2008 was the installation of the WiFi system in the downtown. The project has been quite successful. In fact, between the wire cutting ceremony in the summer and January of 2009, there has been 5913 hours of usage for the system. Moving forward the EDC will continue to promote the system and secure more advertising for the log-in page. The goal for WiFi in 2009 is to find ways to use it in an effort to pull more potential customers off Rt 28 who otherwise may not stop in town.

Like the WiFi, another possible way to draw people to town is with a Park and Ride. Park and Rides are used as a meeting place for people who want to car pool. Park and Rides have been wildly successful in the Concord area, and given that, the EDC felt it appropriate to consider where and how Pittsfield could benefit from one. There are two main benefits of a Park and Ride. First, it will provide a way for Pittsfield residents to utilize car pool services more conveniently. On average, every American spends about \$8,800 per year to commute, and carpooling could help commuters to save some of this money. Secondly, a Park and Ride is a regional destination for commuters twice a day. By establishing a Park and Ride in town there is an increased likelihood that people will shop on the way home from work. Wal Mart in Concord allows carpoolers to use their lot as a Park and Ride for just this reason. With this in mind, the EDC is exploring the possibility establishing a Park and Ride on Rt.

28. NHDOT has recently abandoned a property on Rt. 28 (the old Quonset hut) and the EDC has been reviewing data collected by CNHRPC to explore how feasible a Park and Ride is. With this data, the EDC hopes to convince NHDOT to establish a Park and Ride at this location.

Another major accomplishment was the updating of the EDC's website. The intent was to make the EDC's website easier to use and more likely to attract business to town. In the 21st Century, a website is often the "face" of the community. By communicating what business need on a town website in a user-friendly fashion, it will be more likely that Pittsfield will make the "first cut" (that being a modern, responsive local government) when a business is looking for a place to put down roots. Feedback was taken from the NH Department of Economic Development as well as members the business community as to what would be useful and the website represents the fruit of these efforts. The EDC website should be thought of as a living document, and any suggested changes should be sent to the EDC.

These represent some of the EDC's major accomplishments for the year, and like the past year, EDC will build upon these successes. Like 2008, 2009 will be just as busy for the EDC, and the members would like to thank the residents of Pittsfield for their support. Any citizens of Pittsfield are welcome to attend EDC meetings at 5:30 PM on every other Wednesday evening.

A Message from the District Committee

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the 10th consecutive year, 2009. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. Prices for recyclables stayed strong through most of 2008, resulting in an end of year cash surplus of \$118,596.88. The market for recyclables, however, evaporated in late 2008, likely due to the general downturn in the economy. The Committee expects the market to come back slowly during 2009; however the District will see a much reduced revenue stream from the sale of recyclables during 2009.

You may recall that the District was required to change the way it uses its vehicle scales during most of 2008. The change addressed a violation of NH Weights & Measures rules, but also created an economic hardship on both the District and the residents who were using the scales. At the end of June, 2008, Governor Lynch signed into law, legislation which changed the Weights & Measures requirements and allowed the District to revert to its original practices.

Comments from the public are always welcome. The District Committee meets the last Thursday of each month (except Nov. & Dec.) at the District facility at 7:00 PM. The Public is invited.

2008 ANNUAL REPORT TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

This report is presented to the Board of Directors of the Capital Area Fire Compact as a summary of general activities for the 2008 calendar year. It is also forwarded to the governing bodies of the Compact's member communities for informational purposes.

The Compact departments provide emergency fire and rescue services, including emergency dispatching, to its twenty member communities. The Compact's operational area is 711 square miles with a resident population of 124,827. We also provide and receive mutual aid responses with communities beyond our member area.

Dispatch services are provided by the City of Concord Fire Department's Communications Center utilizing eight shift dispatchers and the Dispatch Supervisor. Fire and Emergency Medical dispatched calls totaled 21,967 in 2008. We continue to be one of the busiest regional dispatch centers in New Hampshire. The detailed activity report by community is attached.

The Chief Coordinator responded to 152 incidents in 2008, assisted departments with management functions on major incidents, and participated with Chief Officers on mutual aid response planning. Data entry of dispatch information is handled at the Compact's administrative office utilizing a part-time Administrative Assistant. The Chief Coordinator continued to participate on several state and regional committees that affect mutual aid operations. The 2007 Command Vehicle responds to all major mutual aid incidents and is available to function as a Command Post.

In 2008, the State of New Hampshire suffered heavy damage from severe weather conditions. One of these major events was a tornado that touched down in the Deerfield/Epsom area on July 24th and quickly traveled northerly ending in the Ossipee area. This event caused heavy property destruction and the loss of a life. The other major event was a severe ice storm in December in the southern sections of New Hampshire. Heavy ice damage caused major power outages affecting upwards of 300,000 residents and businesses for many days. These events tested the resources of many public safety agencies, including the Compact. Although many of our member communities were directly damaged, we were able to play a major role in providing personnel and equipment resources during both of these events to other communities. Most of these responses were provided through use of the New Hampshire Fire Mobilization Plan, a response plan that the Compact heavily supports and participates in.

With the aid of Homeland Security grant funding, we continue to move forward toward completion of radio upgrades to digital capability. The installation of a digital capable radio console is in progress at Fire Alarm Dispatch as this report is being written.

The 2008 Compact operating budget was \$ 851,282. All Compact operations, including the Chief Coordinator's position, office, command vehicle, and dispatch services are provided through this budget. Funding by the member communities is based on a combination of property valuations and population.

The Compact Training Committee chaired by Assistant Chief Dick Pistey, with members Chief Keith Gilbert, Chief Gary Johnson, and Chief Peter Angwin assisted all departments in hosting mutual aid training exercises during the year. Mutual aid drills involve several departments and test the system capabilities in fire suppression, emergency medical, mass casualty, rescue, hazardous materials, incident management, and personnel safety. We thank the Training Committee for their continuing support to the Compact.

The Central New Hampshire HazMat Team, representing 55 communities in Capital Area and Lakes Region mutual aid systems continues to train and responds to hazardous materials incidents in our combined coverage area. The team operates under the direction of Chief Bill Weinhold with three response units and will welcome personnel interested in becoming active members. We appreciate and thank the team members for their dedication in providing this important emergency service.

We encourage all departments to send representatives and actively participate in all Compact meetings. Your input is needed on all issues and your members need to be informed of Compact activities and planning.

Thanks to all departments for your great cooperation.

Established in accordance with state law, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 communities in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties. The Town of Pittsfield is a member in good standing of the Commission.

The Commission's mission is to comply with State statute by preparing and adopting regional plans and a regional housing needs assessment and by evaluating developments of regional impact, to provide data, information, training, and high-quality, cost-effective services to our member communities, to advocate for our member communities and assist and encourage them in intermunicipal endeavors, and to coordinate our efforts with the other regional planning commissions in New Hampshire.

On behalf of the Town of Pittsfield in 2008, CNHRPC staff:

- Provided technical assistance to local officials and citizens, as issues related to land use, transportation, environmental, economic, and general planning.
- Provided economic development services to the Town, obtaining a WIFI grant on its behalf and assisting in economic development studies and promotion.

In addition to the specific services described above, in 2008 the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission:

- Held four Commission meetings (in February, June, September, and November) with programs including transportation policy in NH, the new workforce housing law, and green building techniques. CNHRPC Commission meetings are open to the public and interested citizens are encouraged to attend. Please refer to the calendar on our website for upcoming meetings and events.
- Coordinated workshops related to Planning Board process, land use/transportation planning issues, and Innovative Land Use techniques and hosted APA audioweb conferences.
- Conducted over 200 traffic counts throughout the region and analyzed accident and other NH DOT data.
- Adopted a new Regional Transportation Plan and a Coordinated Transit Plan.
- Coordinated meetings of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC). The TAC:
 - -- Renders technical advice to the CNHRPC regarding transportation plans, programs, and projects;

-- Evaluates and ranks application for the Transportation Enhancement (TE) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) programs. Each program is competitive statewide with more than 3 million dollars in federal funding per year for the TE program and 7 million for the CMAQ program.

-- Evaluates and ranks projects within the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The Regional TIP provides an avenue for projects to be considered for inclusion within the Statewide 10 Year Transportation Improvement Plan which is the guiding document for all major highway improvements on state roads.

- -- Reviews and recommends adoption of the Regional Transportation Plan.
- Provided continuing technical assistance to the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMRLAC) and the Five Rivers Conservation Trust.
- Through the N.H. Department of Environmental Services Regional Environmental Planning Program [environmental planning support to the nine regional planning commissions], 2008 REPP work items included editing and producing the first volume of an Innovative Land Use Techniques handbook and assistance to member communities in adopting ILU techniques.
- Through the N.H. Office of Energy and Planning, utilized Targeted Block Grant funds to update the CNHRPC Regional Housing Needs Assessment, to update the GIS system, and to provide technical assistance to local officials and communities.
- Prepared numerous grant applications for the region as a whole and on behalf of member communities, including EPA Brownfields/petroleum grants, local source water protection grants, HCPP (Housing and Conservation Planning Program) and "moose plate" grants, and Safe Routes to School grants.
- Updated our website to provide better access to land use, environmental, transportation, GIS, and other data.
- With the financial support of Concord 2020, developed and implemented an alternative transportation service "PATH" – Program for Alternative Transportation and Health – which encourages and provides incentives for people to rideshare, bicycle, walk, or take transit to work.
- On behalf of the New Hampshire Association of Regional Planning Commissions, with the generous financial support of New Hampshire Housing, NH Department of Environmental Services, CDFA, and NHARPC, planned and held the 2008 Fall Planning and Zoning Conference at Loon Mountain.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

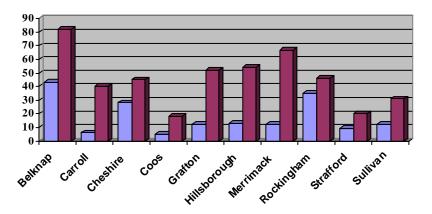
Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <u>www.des.state.nh.us</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at <u>www.nhdfl.org</u>.

Spring fire season lasted unusually long this past year, with very high fire danger stretching into the first week of June. Once again, the rains started to fall during the summer and the fire activity was fairly light for the remainder of the year. The acreage burned was less than that of 2007. The largest forest fire during the 2008 season burned approximately 54 acres on Rattlesnake Mountain in Rumney on White Mountain National Forest property. Another 39 acre fire occurred on Mount Major in Alton during the month of April. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2008 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Suncook Valley Regional Town Association

The Suncook Valley Regional Town Association (SVRTA) was formed in November of 2007 through an initiative undertaken by the Chichester Board of Selectmen. The Board's intent was to create an informal, regional group comprised of area towns for the purpose of sharing operational data and identifying opportunities for possible collaborative arrangements between the towns. The desired goal was to ensure Town operations were as efficient as possible and to reduce costs where possible.

The SVRTA was initially comprised of the towns of Chichester, Epsom, Barnstead, Pittsfield and Pembroke, with the Town of Strafford having recently joined and the Town of Northwood currently considering participation. Towns are typically represented by a member of their Board of Selectmen and the group meets on average every six to eight weeks. All meetings are posted and minutes are maintained on Chichester's Town website.

Since its inception, the SVRTA has proven to be a valuable forum for the exchange of ideas regarding operational practices among the participating towns. The group has had discussions spanning a wide array of topics regarding potential areas for collaboration among some or all of the towns that have included:

- Employee benefits
- Joint purchasing opportunities for items such as road salt, sand, paving contracts, office supplies and heating oil
- Regionalized assessing
- Shared building inspection/code enforcement
- Police department issues such as shared coverage, officer certification, K-9 Units, regional prosecutors & dispatch services
- Fire department issues such as coordinated equipment purchases among towns and potential regionalized coverage

The above list only represents a sample of topics discussed thus far, but it should demonstrate that the SVRTA is looking at all aspects of operations within our respective towns in an effort to share the talents and resources among area towns in order to improve operational efficiency or service levels and reduce costs wherever possible.

Although the group sees some potential for consolidated services among the towns in certain areas, it recognizes that most opportunities will likely just involve the sharing and coordinating of resources which also can represent great value in reducing the operational burden and costs of certain functions so smaller towns don't have to always "go it alone."

One major accomplishment worth noting in 2008 was the formation of a health insurance benefits risk pool. By combining the 100+ eligible employees within the SVRTA's six towns, we were able to achieve a <u>15 percent</u> <u>net reduction</u> in our collective 2009 insurance costs, when compared to 2008 rates. I believe this serves as an excellent example of the types of opportunities that still exist and should be pursued.

The SVRTA has demonstrated that town's can work together in a constructive fashion to achieve mutually beneficial results and overcome the challenges of "local politics" or a general resistance to change that can sometimes arise. The group is pleased with its progress to date and looks forward to continued efforts in a number of areas over the coming year, especially as all towns continue to cope with substantial budget challenges.

UNH Cooperative Extension – Merrimack County

UNH Cooperative Extension, the public outreach arm of the University of New Hampshire, has engaged New Hampshire residents for 94 years with a broad variety of non-formal educational offerings. One in four Merrimack County residents took advantage of at least one Extension program last year.

We offer programs in parenting, family finances, food safety, home gardening, 4-H (including clubs, camps, special interest programs and after school programs for children and teens), nutrition education for low-income families, and acculturation for refugee families. We respond to the needs of forest landowners, commercial farmers, niche growers, farmers' markets, and many other groups.

Merrimack County Extension educators also work extensively with towns and school districts, organizing and advising after-school programs, helping school and town groundskeepers maintain athletic fields, landscaped areas, and town forests. We provide guidance to community boards on current use, timber tax law, and other land-use issues. We also help social service agencies plan programs and stay current with the latest research and best practices.

Our county staff participate—and sometimes take leadership roles—in many state and local coalitions, among them the Franklin and Concord Asset Building Coalitions, the Concord Substance Abuse Coalition, the Timberland Owners Association, N.H. Farm and Forest Exposition board, Ausbon Sargent Land Trust outreach committee, N.H. Association for Infant Mental Health, the state Marriage and Family Advisory Board, the N.H. Volunteer Administrators Association, and Pittsfield Youth Workshop.

Merrimack County Extension provides fact-sheet notebooks to all town libraries and our educators often appear on WPTL Radio (107.7 FM), which offers information to residents throughout the station's listening area.

UNH Cooperative Extension operates a statewide toll-free Info Line (1-877-398-4769) at our Family, Home & Garden Education Center, staffed Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m., and 5:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. Last year, the Info Line handled nearly 700 requests from Merrimack County residents.

Finally, UNH Extension trains and supports more 5,000 volunteers statewide: 4-H leaders, master gardeners, wildlife coverts, community tree stewards, water quality monitors, marine docents, and others, who extend the reach of Extension programs into many domains of New Hampshire life. If volunteer opportunities interest you, please call Merrimack County Extension Office at 225-5505 or 796-2151, or stop by the office at 315 Daniel Webster Highway in Boscawen next to the County Nursing Home on Route 3.
